

## FYSA OFFICIAL STATE ROSTERS

The Got Soccer software operates quite differently than our former program. No longer are there stops in place to prevent a registrar from doing an action that may not be in the best interests of the teams. We have just noticed that passes can be printed before players are placed on the Official State Roster. This is in place for those states where registrars can print passes for various reasons. We are reminding clubs and coaches, that just because a function is available, it does not mean that it should be used.

FYSA has set up roster limits within Got Soccer for the FYSA OFFICIAL STATE ROSTER, where a team can not have more players than the rules for State Cup allow. The limits are set in accordance with National Championship Series (NCS) rules, currently as follows:

U13 thru U15: Maximum # of players at any time is 18 players

U16 thru U19: Maximum # of players at any time is 22 players \*

(\* must name a game roster of 18 from the 22 rostered)

However, these limits are not in the club account where teams are formed. If a club prints passes before the OFFICIAL STATE ROSTER is generated, it is possible to have over rostered the **TEAM MAKING THEM INELIGIBLE FOR NCS PLAY.**

Please read and follow the instructions below carefully.

- Registrar should NOT create or print passes in the player or team section of the Registrar Tab.
- Registrars MUST enter all teams into a club registration event, freeze and generate the OFFICIAL STATE ROSTER, and verify its information before generating passes.
- There is a “show matching players” button in the top. That should always be activated, so the registrar will know if the player has another account that needs to be dealt with.
- Only print passes and rosters from the Document generation area.
- Coaches should get in the habit of looking at their official state roster in the documents section of their account, and not the “team roster”.
- Players listed on the team roster, and not on the official state roster that have passes may jeopardize a team’s state cup eligibility.
